Reaching the Unreached:

RTU is one of the charities the Priory is supporting. It is working in southern India helping the poorest and most marginalised people, particularly women and children, by providing healthcare, clean water, housing, education and support. It cares for orphaned or abandoned children, many affected by HIV/AIDS, in children's villages, and provides education until they are able to live independently. The Priory's donations have already provided Priory House and Lancaster House for two families whose lives they have transformed.

In Lancaster House live Kannan (aged 55), his wife Jeyalakshmi (42), their son Danapal (17), and their

daughter Logeswari (14). Kannan had major health problems which resulted in his having to give up his job in a mill, and his wife has a major hearing loss. They were struggling living in a very inadequate leaking hut, and trying to earn enough money to feed their children. Fortunately they approached RTU who have provided them with this safe house with electricity. They are now much happier and their children are able to be educated with the little income from his petty shop.

In Priory House live Nagarajan (32), his wife Kaliswari (29), their son Masanakathirvel (10), and their daughter Vinothini (8). Their son tragically was born with an ano-rectal malformation which has resulted in his having to have ongoing major operations, costing the family a great deal of money. The situation was exacerbated by their hut being filled with rain, making it difficult for them to care for their son properly. Fortunately Nagarajan heard about RTU who, due to the family's hand-to-mouth existence, built them Priory House where the family now lives peacefully. Their children are both at school and they are able to look after their son in a safe environment.

It is good to have first hand information of the two families who are very grateful for this life-changing support. Our next donation will hopefully provide "St. Mary's House" to another needy family. Christine Dickinson

Sainsbury's and Fairtrade:

Many of the congregation will have heard that Sainsbury's have decided to drop the Fairtrade mark from their own brand of tea and replace it with their own label "Fairly traded" instead.



The Fairtrade Foundation has built up a reputation with growers, producers, brand-owners, and consumers over 25 years. The mark is instantly recognisable and gives a clear message that the goods we buy meet international standards of fairness and directly benefit communities of makers, growers, and farmers around the world. No self-governed scheme can hope to deliver the same consistency, recognition, and engender the same breadth of consumer confidence.

Already 220,000 tea producers are adversely affected by the decision and their concerns have been blatantly ignored. Furthermore, although this is officially a pilot the suspicion is that Sainsbury's will roll out the new standard across other products including bananas and coffee. There is now an active campaign "Don't Ditch Fairtrade" with a petition supported by Oxfam, CAFOD, Christian Aid,

The second is, well, an even bigger dream and, fortunately, not solely dependent on me - wouldn't it be great if every child who came to the Priory felt so welcomed and wanted that they became part of the Priory family and in doing so met with Jesus?

Lectio Divina - St Thomas' Chapel in the Priory:

Further Lectio Divina sessions are planned for 4 December.

Lectio Divina or divine reading represents an ancient Christian practice of praying with Scripture. It became a regular practice in monasteries by the time of St. Benedict in the 6th century.

During Lectio Divina, the practitioner listens to a text from the Scriptures with the "ear of the heart". The method of Lectio Divina includes moments of reading, reflecting on, responding to and resting in the Word of God. The interaction among the moments is dynamic and the movement through the moments follows the spontaneous prompting of the Holy Spirit.

Everybody is welcome to join, either as a one off or on a more regular basis. No previous experience or knowledge of the Scriptures is necessary. Once learned, Lectio Divina can also be practiced individually at any time or place. Please contact me if you would like more information or just come along on the

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Paul Baxter - a tribute:

I remember it well. It was 2006 and we could scarcely believe the good news that Paul Baxter had decided to retire to Morecambe was going to rejoin the Priory Choir. The untimely death of Michael Orr in the previous year had left a significant gap in the tenor section and had wounded the morale of the whole choir. Through his immense talent as a choral singer and his sparkling personality, Paul was to play an absolutely fundamental role in steering us through this difficult and dark period.

Paul was a legendary figure in the choir. When I joined in 1959, he had just left although, as his father Jim was Head Verger, he was still on the scene, and of course his photo as Head Boy adorned the wall of the choir vestry. He cut something of a hero figure to us fledgling choir boys. His reputation as a fine treble still lingered but what impressed us rather more was his 'cool' appearance and his willingness to challenge authority. After all he had had the nerve to drop toothpaste onto a senior choirman's bald pate on the choir holiday to Rossall School - for which misdemeanour he had been invited to take early retirement from the choir.

Paul was very much one of our own, although like so many others he was an incomer and a Yorkshireman, arriving in Lancaster when he was 11. He came from a very musical family but it was at the Priory that he discovered and nurtured his love of church music and, under the choir director of the time - Henry Walmsley - Paul could not have found a finer teacher. Great though the choir now undoubtedly is, we may just pause to remember that in those days it broadcast Choral Evensong regularly on BBC Radio, Paul himself taking part in many of those broadcasts. Paul's ability was recognised beyond the Priory. In 1957 he won the treble section of the then famous Morecambe Music Festival - an achievement of which he was justifiably very proud as the adjudicator was Herbert Howells, the doyen of English church music.

His was a romantic soul and it was this that ultimately led to his departure from Lancaster. He had first met Sylvia, who was to be the love of his life, when she was on holiday in Yorkshire. Faithfully keeping up a pen-friend relationship down the years and meeting up in the holidays, Paul eventually decided that this separation was too much to bear and sought a permanent transfer to Edinburgh so as to be near her. They eventually married and settled down in Helensburgh.

Throughout his life in Helensburgh, Paul's passion for church music remained unabated. Though first and foremost a singer, he was also a talented organist. He sang in the choir at Paisley Abbey which he joined to support his son Martin as he embarked upon his musical journey. He was, at different times, organist and choir master at Holy Trinity, Paisley, the Clyde Submarine Base, and St Michael and All Angels Church, Helensburgh. Upon his return to Morecambe, Paul threw himself with great verve into the local musical scene. Besides the Priory Choir, he joined the St Lawrence Singers and Cumbria Baroque, and deputised on the organ in many local churches, most of all at St Oswald's, Warton and St Michael and All Angels, Beetham. He was delighted when he was able to make a CD with Margaret Pattinson, director of St Lawrence Singers, and Ian Pattinson, our own Priory organist, and we are delighted that we have a permanent record of his astonishing talent.

Paul was a fine musician. He was naturally musical. His purity and clarity of tone as a tenor were complemented with accuracy, timing and phrasing. Nowhere was this better illustrated than in his beautiful rendition of the solo in the Nunc Dimittis of Howells' Evening Service: Coll Reg. It was spine-tingling. He was an outstanding chorister and embodied the spirit of the Priory Choir. Behind the scenes, he was full of fun, always ready with a witty 'one-liner'. He was kind, supportive and encouraging - a quality noted by newcomers and younger members especially. In the vestry and in church he led by example, aiming for high standards, but making no big deal when we fell short. He was a 'safe pair of hands' - as steadfast, reliable and true in his singing as he was in his dealings with us all.

Paul had a great zest for life. Besides his many musical activities, he enjoyed riding his motor cycle (a life-long passion), swimming and walking his dog. His illness was a cruel blow, but the courage he showed throughout was an inspiration to us all. Paul was essentially a family man, devoted to his wife Sylvia, his son Martin and daughter Lesley, and his grandson Ethan. To them all we extend our love and sympathy at this time. Andrew Nicholson

musical plants, which react to gentle contact. Each plant reacts to touch in a different way, producing a specific sound and lights. Our invisible electrostatic energy acts on the plant branches and encourages them to react.

In their artwork, the artists Scenocosme create hybrids between plants and digital technology. Mixing reality with imagination, Scenocosme animates that which we cannot detect and create a sensory experience that encourages us to think about our invisible relationship with other living things. Their artworks are exhibited in numerous museums, contemporary art centres and digital art festivals in the world.
