THANKS from MUSTARD SEED

The photos above illustrate the wonderful response to our request for warm clothing. Much of this was gratefully accepted by many of our Mustard Seed guests. Very many thanks to all the members of the Priory congregation who so kindly rummaged in cupboards and attics to generate this terrific clothing and sleeping bag collection for our Mustard Seed guests. A large proportion of the items are already in use by the homeless in Lancaster.

MUSTARD SEED AND FISH (Faith groups In Support of the Homeless)

Mustard Seed at the Priory is a member of FISH, an organisation in Lancaster which brings together a number of local groups in support of the homeless and vulnerable of the area in a variety of ways. These include the Christchurch Night Shelter; Lancaster and District Homeless Action Service (LDHAS) based at Edward Street and providing a range of services; Olive Branch giving support and operating a food bank; The Ark at St. Thomas' and ourselves at Mustard Seed offering a meal and fellowship on Friday and Tuesday evenings respectively. Others include Lancaster City Council; Christians Alive (who provide a breakfast on winter Sunday mornings); the Christmas Shelter (providing food and a bed for several nights); and Oak Tree House (offering supported housing to help the homeless make a fresh start). Representatives of these groups meet regularly during the year to plan co-operative activities, exchange information, keep up to date with what each is doing and provide valuable feed back.

(Christine Dickinson is our Mustard Seed representative at these FISH meetings). The co-operation is especially vital during the winter period, in particular at Christmas which can be an even more difficult time for the homeless and vulnerable in our community. For example, over recent weeks there have been a an average of 21 people at the Ark and 15 at Mustard Seed. On the Friday before Christmas 29 people went to the Olive Branch for help. At the Christmas Shelter 25 people enjoyed a Christmas dinner. Since its opening in early November Christchurch's Night Shelter has received a total of 41 different individuals, with an average of 6 per night. However, every year there is a gap in provision after the

Christmas Shelter until the Christchurch Shelter opens in early January. This gap is currently the subject of discussion.

By the time you read this the annual Winter Warmer will have taken place at St Thomas' hall, when many of the above organisations get together to provide a meal and entertainment for up to about 40 guests.

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Priory People

Andrew Nicholson introduces an occasional series of profiles of Priory People. He begins the series with a profile of Colin Whiteside.

Colin is undeniably one of the longer-serving if not the longest-serving Priory member. In a career spanning more than 75 years, he has devoted himself to the Priory family in dedicated and selfless service.

Colin is a true Lancastrian. Born and bred in Lancaster he first appeared on the Priory scene in 1941 as a choirboy, when Alan Stephenson (formerly organist of Coventry Cathedral who came to the Priory after the bombing of the cathedral in 1940) was choirmaster. Colin remembers that these were great years to be in the choir - under Alan Stephenson's direction the choir reached high standards and broadcast regularly on BBC Radio, a tradition continued by his successor, Henry Walmsley. Although expecting to leave the choir when Alan Stephenson retired - by this time he was Head Boy and his voice was changing - his leadership qualities were recognised and he was asked to stay on to support Henry Walmsley with the younger choristers in his first year. Then, as now, Colin was clearly a force to be reckoned with! Later, as is the case with many former choristers, he became a crucifer and server.

National Service with the RAF took Colin away from Lancaster and, such was the promise he showed in selection tests, at the end of this compulsory 3-year period he was given the option of a permanent career with the RAF, away from Lancaster. He decided, however, to return to Lancaster, took a job with Ribble Buses (where his father had worked as a driver) and began night school classes in electrical

engineering. Important qualifications soon followed enabling him to embark upon a career in the electrical supply industry, working initially at Lancaster Power Station. He was clearly a high flyer (though he would never put it like this) and rose rapidly through the ranks, working in 5 different power stations, until he eventually was appointed as a commissioning engineer at Heysham 1 & 2 Power Stations. There his work took him into the highly-charged field of industrial relations as much as with the technical complexities of electrical generation and supply, but on his watch good practice and procedures were established and harmony

Colin doesn't do things by halves! He never let the challenges of such a demanding job get in the way of immersing himself fully into the life of the Priory. And his record of service to our church family across the years is simply amazing and without parallel. Serving under 5 vicars (6 if you count his youthful years under Ben Pollard) he has been PCC member (1956 - 2012), Sidesman (1956 -

present), Churchwarden (2000 - 2008), Ripley Governor (1982 - present), Priory Hall Trustee (1983 - present). These years have seen significant changes and challenges but throughout them all Colin has been a constant presence and a safe pair of hands at the tiller. In many of his roles - at the Priory and Ripley - he has been able to apply directly much of the practical knowledge and skills gained from his working life, and both are immeasurably the better for it. Whenever Colin has undertaken a job he has given it his all and gone far more than the extra mile to ensure success.

I have known Colin and Dorothy (who sadly died in 2001 and was also very involved in the life and work of the Priory), and their daughters Sarah and Jane, for almost all my life. I am very grateful to him for his friendship, kindness and support and for his example of integrity, honesty and Christian faithfulness.

Following the annual Founders' Day Service at Ripley in July 2015 a special ceremony was held to open the academy's new Science Labs. The new block was officially opened by the Chair of Governors, Professor John Crewdson, and has been named "The Colin Whiteside Block" in recognition of Mr Whiteside's longstanding chairmanship of the Governors' Buildings and Grounds Committee for over 20 years. Mr Whiteside is the academy's longest serving Governor having been in post since 1982. Colin is pictured (right) with Prof Crewdson.


Traidcraft

Report from the Priory Choir



The Choir had a busy time in the Christmas period. At the service of Nine Lessons and Carols we sang a number of pieces new to the repertoire. In addition to the popular Torches by Joubert (commemorating his 90th birthday in 2017), we introduced the very beautiful Here is the little door by Howells. This is a setting of words by Frances Chesterton and is dedicated to her husband, the better known G.K. In places the text is quite sombre, reflecting the time it was written, just before the end of World War I.

Our own Director of Music, Don Gillthorpe, contributed two new pieces: the anthem From East to West and a tune, Lancaster Priory, a setting of Sing of the child of Bethlehem, words by Chris Newlands. All of these pieces of course formed part of the familiar and much-loved pattern of the Nine Lessons service.

Some of this music appeared again in the two Candlelit Spectacular concerts, which have now become regular features of the pre-Christmas season. Familiar favourites, such as the arrangements by Julian Davies of Rudolph and Santa Claus is coming to town, were joined by a seasonal piece by John Rutter, The reluctant dragon. Once again this year we were pleased to welcome pupils from a number of Lancaster primary schools who took part in some of the

After a busy week the main choir were given a break on the morning of Christmas Eve when the 1000am Eucharist was sung by the Youth Choir, which welcomes back each year a number of choir alumni who are home in Lancaster for Christmas: it is always great to see and hear them again and to find out how they are progressing in their careers.

For the Midnight Mass a new setting had been commissioned from Oliver Tarney, a native of Lancaster but now Head of Singing and Composition at Winchester College. Oli has written for us in the past, and this Missa Media Nocte was greatly enjoyable to sing. Although the orchestral version hints at some carol tunes, we shall also be able to sing it on other occasions.

Looking ahead, new music to be added to the repertoire up to Easter includes Be thou my vision by Bob Chilcott and two pieces for the trebles: White's Prayer of St Richard of Chichester and Tota pulchra est by Duruflé. The full choir will be learning Stainer's setting of the Evensong Canticles for Easter Sunday.

At Christmas we sang the Hallelujah chorus from Handel's Messiah. We have this and some other extracts in the library, but would very much like to buy a set of the complete oratorio. We could then learn individual numbers, with a view to a complete performance at the Patronal Festival in 2019: nothing like planning ahead! To help finance this purchase the Choir are asking members of the congregation to sponsor a copy at £8.00 each: sheets on which you may sign up for a specific copy number, perhaps as a memorial, will be at the back of Church. The Choir will be most grateful for your support.

Finally, we hope you will enjoy the old and new music which the Choir will be singing at the services during the coming year. Brian Kirtley
